#### **Destruction beyond the bombing**

- Largest oil leak in history Kuwait during the first Gulf War. Estimated **500 million gallons of oil** released into the gulf.
- Chaos in post-war Afghanistan brought unprecedented levels of deforestation due to increased illegal logging.
- Destruction of electrical grid in Iraq resulted in the long term use of thousands of diesel generators.
- This is before we consider the impact of reconstruction especially in the context of the colossal impact of concrete production.

# 2. Military climate impact



#### What is the climate impact of the Military?

- Every sector of human activity is subject to carbon reporting and reduction targets with one single exception the global military.
- The <u>UN Framework Convention on Climate Change</u> does not require Governments to report military emissions, so most do not.
- The US initially negotiated an exception for military emissions at Kyoto, subsequent attempts to close this loophole have resulted in emissions calculations are ill defined and 'voluntary'.

*"The US military is the largest single source of greenhouse gas emissions in the world – with a carbon footprint greater than that of most countries. If the Pentagon were a country, its fuel use alone would make it the world's 47th largest emitter"*

## *"Britain's military-industrial sector annually emits more greenhouse gases than 60 individual countries. Equivalent to 6 million average UK cars annually."*


• Overall the military sector could contribute as much as **6% of total global emissions** - greater than that of civilian aviation.

#### **Reducing UK Carbon vs. Military Spending**

Below is a comparison of the core military **budget in this parliament (2021-25)** with that for reducing UK carbon emissions as part of **UK Net Zero Strategy**.



For every £1 spent on reducing UK carbon emissions we spend £7.45 on the UK military

#### **Resisting military & fossil fuel expansion**

We must not allow the suffering of the Ukrainian people to be used as an excuse to:

- funnel more public funds to the (booming) arms industry.
- push through new oil and gas exploration.
- push further public service cuts
- waterdown or undermine international commitments on climate action.



#### **Responding to the drums of war**

- The 2021 Defence Review <u>already</u> committed to a 14% budget increase - the largest in almost 70 years. It also increased the limits on the UK's nuclear arsenal by over 40%. UK military spending is now 3rd highest in the world.
- Militarism is fueling insecurity. Genuine human security can only be based on facing common existential threats around climate, disease and poverty.
- Join a campaign. Raise these issues in your union branch, with your MP, in response to every article you read calling for more money for armaments.
